I look forward to seeing many of you at the chapel during the summer and share in the joy that St. Andrew's brings to all of us.



Happy Places & Happy Moments

I have had the honor and privilege of celebrating and blessing many marriages during my nearly 58 years as a Priest in the Episcopal Church. More recently several of those marriages have occurred at St. Andrew's, long before I became your new Vicar.

Oftentimes I have begun a

wedding rehearsal by simply welcoming the wedding party and guests and then sharing with them two of my several Happy Places: ST. ANDREW'S CHAPEL and FENWAY PARK!

People who know me understand quite quickly that I am not only an Episcopal Priest. I am also a sports addict and lover of all things Boston: Red Sox, Celtics, Patriots, and Bruins.

Why is Fenway Park a Happy Place for me? When I was child of about ten, I played most of my baseball on sand lots and dirt, even before my Little League days. One day my Dad and older brothers took me to Fenway for the first time. When we walked up the ramp and I saw the field it took my breath away! Beautiful green grass with perfect infield carved in, the stands packed with fans on a beautiful Saturday afternoon, and the Green Monster left field wall in the distance! I have never forgotten that moment. As often as I have returned to Fenway over the years, that moment comes back to me, and it always will.

But something else happened when I was around ten. I was on summer vacation here on the New Hampshire Seacoast with my parents who always looked for a church to attend and happened to choose our jewel on the seacoast! Although I was not as awestruck as I was with Fenway, there was something special about this beautiful summer chapel that was never to be forgotten.

More journeys to St. Andrew's-by-the Sea would cause St. Andrew's to gradually become another Happy Place as an adult. A Sunday morning service here many Sundays ago when Bob Golledge greeted me and my spouse with your special hospitality. A request to perform a wedding here about twenty years after that. An invitation to come here for a Sunday morning service and more requests for weddings and baptisms.

These moments added up to a special realization. Each time I made the turn onto Church Road from Ocean Boulevard, I would begin to experience a sense of calm, peace, and serenity, even after a day of difficulty or helter skelter. St. Andrew's was becoming a Happy Place!

Fenway happened all at once and St. Andrew's has happened over a much longer period of time. But I am convinced that God has been at work in both situations and has prompted me to proclaim at wedding rehearsals that I have two Happy Places: ST. ANDREW'S and FENWAY PARK! And of course, I do have more!

Our lovely chapel-by-the-sea wintered well without any damage and spring work is underway prepping the building and grounds for another summer. As of this writing we have repaired, repainted, and reinstalled the chapel signs and brackets on both Ocean Boulevard and Church Road. Inside, light bulbs have been replaced, and the sound system, piano, and organ are up and running, ready for the first service of the year.


Of note is that we changed ground maintenance companies after the previous contractor declined the job going forward. The new company works on all the other properties on Church Road which makes for nice continuity and additional pride in their work. Both the grounds and the parking lot have been cleaned and look great, the garden edged and mulched. The granite/brick near the rear entrance was reset to eliminate the tripping hazard and the granite benches have been leveled to be more inviting to sit and reflect.

Work is on-going in getting the pavilion closer to reality. Once LCHIP approved the project, we pulled together a structural engineer and architect to fine tune both the foundation and structure. We hope to get permitted by August for spring 2026 construction.

In the meantime, we are planning on setting up the hospitality tent again this year at 9:00 am on June 7th (rain date Sunday the 8th) with a small crew of volunteers. PLEASE feel free to come by and lend a hand if you can. The extra help would be very appreciated!

Like you I'm sure, I am looking forward to another year of summer services and continued enjoyment of the efforts of all the dedicated volunteers who work together to make our summer season happen.

Treasurer's Report

I am pleased to report that our financial condition remains positive. This past year we were able to operate within our budget while increasing our Outreach support to the community and completing our stained-glass window project. We are grateful for our weekly worship donations, our generous benefactors, past and present, and for the grants we receive from the NH Land & Community Investment Program.

Our endowment funds, professionally managed by the Diocese directed investment manager, grew by 7% in 2024. Our self-directed investment funds, held at Vanguard,

increased by 15%. The combination of professional management, a long-term investment horizon, and the placement of our assets in lower fee, highly rated broad based funds, positions us well for weathering market fluctuations.

We are grateful for all within the St. Andrew's community who generously support our mission of maintaining a beautiful chapel for worship, celebration, and offering outreach to our neighbors in need.

Did you know???

The 24" tall brass stepped cross was presented by Maude Abbot (1857-c1902) daughter of Edward and Mary Abbot on July 7, 1878. This cross was used for 94 years. It was stolen on Tuesday, August 15, 1972. There were no leads and no chance for recovery. It was normal at that time for the chapel to be left open all summer. We now lock the chapel and have an alarm system. Then, in June of 1974, out of nowhere, we received an unsigned letter "I'm sorry I took your artifact. You will find it in a locked box in the Windsor Locks Connecticut airport," [Bradley International Airport]. The Windsor Locks Police were notified and opened the box at the airport and the cross was returned.
