One of my very favorite activities occurs right here at Kittery Estates where I live. We have a ragtag choral group under the very patient direction of a resident who is a retired organist and choir director. We practice on Sunday afternoons for one hour and then perform a spring and winter concert for residents and two assisted living communities. It is pure unadulterated fun!

At a recent concert we performed

a song made popular by Roy Orbison, one of my favorite vocalists of years ago. In 1964, Roy recorded a haunting song entitled "Pretty Paper". I was honored to sing the introductory solo as follows:

"Crowded street, busy feet hustle by him, Downtown shoppers, Christmas is nigh There he sits all alone on the sidewalk Hoping that you won't pass him by

SHOULD YOU STOP, better not, much too busy You're in a hurry, my how time does fly In the distance the ringing of laughter And in the midst of the laughter, he cries." Should we stop?! That is the question as we approach yet another Advent season and prepare ourselves for the coming of the Messiah. Advent is that countercultural season that begins yet another church year on the Sunday after Thanksgiving. Black Friday begins the pre-Christmas rush of crowded street and busy feet. Should we stop and reach out to that lonely person on the sidewalk? Of course, the answer is a resounding Yes! Do we always stop and reach out? Of course, the answer is a resounding No! Do we sometimes feel like that lonely person on the sidewalk? Maybe!

The world in which we live is clearly in need of people like you and me — people who are willing to stop instead of just passing by. Food insecurity is very high, abuse abounds, and the world peace for which we pray still seems to evade us. In this coming month of crowded street and busy feet, may that red octagon stop sign be a metaphor for us to stop — to think globally and act locally for the world that Jesus the Christ came to save.

You read about it here for several years, and now our Pavilion project is becoming a reality. Over the course of the late summer and fall we were pleased to gain the support of our Church Road neighbors and the approvals of the Rye Beach Village District Planning and Zoning boards. With our building permits in hand, we will start the structure's foundation; probably at about same the time as we go to print on this newsletter. Construction of the above ground Post and Beam building will begin early next spring 2026 and we look forward to putting our new pavilion to use throughout our 150th season of celebration and for many summers after that.

While all that was going on we continued to maintain our beautiful chapel and grounds as usual. The chapel will get closed for the winter after Candlelight Caroling and our Church Road and Chapel signs will come down for protection from the winter winds and weather. Our water heater has failed and that will be replaced before anyone even knows it was a problem.

Finally, on a "well, that is certainly full circle" note, several years ago there was the thought to move the Baptism font to the front of the chapel. To do that, a small, half pew needed to be removed. What to do with an extra chapel pew? Sell it on Face Book Marketplace, of course. And sell it did. However, this fall we were contacted by the new owners checking to see if perhaps we wanted it back. They had good intentions when they purchased it but never did anything with it. As they started to downsize, they concluded they would never use it. And we never did move the font. So here it is, full circle, back at St. Andrew's where it belongs.

#### It's called a what???

The wooden gate at the entrance to our churchyard, common in English churches but rather unique in the country, is called a lychgate.

"Lychgate" is an old English word with lych meaning 'corpse'. Lychgates sometimes have small seats on either side of the gate (ours does not). The tradition of a lychgate dates back to the 16th century. When someone died, they were wrapped in a shroud and carried to the lychgate to

await burial. Depending on the location, some people might stay there to guard against body snatchers. Later they were used to set down the coffin before the service, awaiting the clergyman.
